Celia was awarded the *Revista Canadiense de Estudios Hispánicos* prize for best graduate student essay for her paper, "Ekué Dios' o la influencia de un bembé en *Guanabacoa* (1967) en la poesía de José Ángel Valente." I understand she will also be stepping into the role of graduate student representative to the association, taking over from Javier.

I hope this season brings you clarity, collaboration, and the creative boost you need—whether you're revising a manuscript, presenting your work, or mapping out the next chapter in your teaching.

Book Publication



Quintanilla, Siwar Mayu, A River of Hummingbirds, June 2025. In print and ebook. Supported by the Indigenous Environmental Network-IEN, and a grant from the Ontario Arts Council-Northern Arts Projects Grant, and the Government of Ontario. This collection brings together the work of around forty Indigenous writers, artists, and Elders, highlighting a rich diversity of contemporary experiences and celebrating the connections between lands, waters, languages, and cultures.



Experiencias y memorias de Arcatao: Vol. 1. Edited by Adriana Alas López, Marisol Zarceño, Felipe Quintanilla, and Comité de Memoria Histórica Sobreviviente de Arcatao, MUPI, 2024.

This community book presents 204 stories of individuals who were killed or died as a result of the armed conflict in El Salvador (1970–1992), specifically in the Arcatao district of Chalatenango. It seeks to honor the victims of Arcatao, deepen our understanding of the region's history, and stand as a call to prevent the repetition of political violence.

## Western Student Wins Misfeldt Prize at the CSSG 2025

Yuan Fiona Gao, a student from Faculty of Arts & Humanities, was the much deserving shared recipient of the Kim Misfeldt Prize at the Canadian Summer School in German (CSSG) 2025. Fiona shares the Misfeldt Prize with Nicole Fitzgerald of the McGill U.

The Kim Misfeldt Prize recognizes undergraduate achievements and celebrates building transcultural bridges through intellectual engagement and participation in the international community. In particular, the Prize rewards the outstanding performance of an undergraduate student participant of the CSSG for superior achievement in developing intercultural awareness and intercultural communicative competence



through graded coursework, active engagement in the cultural program, and interpersonal interaction in German with CSSG peers, instructors, and host family members during the sojourn abroad. The Prize also honours and celebrates the outstanding contributions made by Dr. Kim Misfeldt as Director of the CSSG for 14 years and instructor there for 15 years.

Yuan Fiona Gao's accomplishments are especially significant given the very high quality of the nine nominated candidates for this year's award and that the selection of the winners was made by a committee of all CSSG 2025 instructors.

# **Recent Research**

Dr. Angela Borchert is exploring the fascinating world of Weimar's leading thinkers—Goethe, Schiller, Herder, and Bertuch—by examining their influential art, philosophy, and fashion journals from around 1800. Her upcoming overview will appear in a handbook on Der Teutsche Merkur, the Enlightenment's most enduring journal. She's also delving into Germany's first fashion history, published in 1830 by Caroline de la Motte Fouqué for the renowned Morgenblatt für Gebildete Stände, a journal that helped cement Goethe and Schiller's legacies. Dr. Borchert's research uncovers the surprising connections between fashion trends and the making of literary legends.
