Course Content

This is an international survey of the children's novel as a genre from the 19th century on. 3 German and 3 non-German novels constitute our reading list. The course will cover literature meant for younger & older audiences, considering such themes as child-parent relationships, growing up, the power of the imagination, identity formation, freedom etc. Connections to concepts from social science, history, religion, mythology and other disciplines will enrich the discussion.

Lectures in English (all works available in English translation)


Tutorials in German (excerpts from 3 German novels will be read).



Final Exam (**2** hrs.: can be written in English or German) 33%



Portfolio Instructions & Schedule

1 (350 words = 10%; Oct. 10) - Zusammenfassung - in the present tense **Summary** of an episode from one of the 3 German novels on our reading list - in your own words

2 (350 words = 10%; Oct. 26) - Anderer Blickwinkel - in the past tense **New perspective**: retell an episode from the perspective of a **negative** character in 1 of the 3 novels, e.g., Fräulein Rottenmeier or Tante Dete in Heidi -1st person narrative ("I did..."): from the perspective of the character in question

3 (350 words = 15%; **Nov. 19**) - Alternatives Ende - in the past tense Alternative ending for one of the 3 novels: e.g., Bastian fails to name the Queen in Die Unendliche Geschichte

-do not retell the whole story: concentrate on the ending, i.e., the consequences

4 (350 words = 15%; **Dec. 7**) - Prequel* - in the past tense **Prequel** to one of the 3 novels: what happens before the action of the story, e.g., how Barbarossa became what he is in Herr der Diebe

2 versions of every assignment are collected (1st version on the assigned date):

- -upload to OWL under Assignments: Word Files only
- -1st version is given **no grade**: problems are flagged
- -2nd version is given a grade

NB: All assignments in this course are to be done in German.
