## 4. Course Description and Design

### Antirequisite: Spanish 2223

Intermediate Spanish provides students who already possess knowledge of basic grammatical structures with more advanced training in the Spanish language. The primary emphasis is on effective oral and written expression, to permit students who have completed this course to communicate their ideas and opinions with clarity in a variety of academic and social settings. Students will read different types of Spanish texts, and watch short films designed to familiarize the students with the Hispanic Culture, the human and intellectual contexts of the Spanish language, and to provide examples of authentic contemporary usage.

Students will:

- develop their ability to comprehend Spanish in a variety of situations
- strengthen their capacity to express themselves in different cultural contexts
- review grammar structures from SP1030, reinforce students' Spanish knowledge, and expand students' communicative skills
- build knowledge, skills, and attitudes to develop students' intercultural competence
- establish a strong foundation for further study of Spanish

## Classes are conducted in Spanish.

Virtual <u>synchronous</u> learning refers to the virtual classes that will take place on zoom during the scheduled class time. All the students enrolled in the same section of the course will engage in learning at the same time.

Virtual **asynchronous** learning refers to the time that students are supposed to work independently. Materials and assignments will be provided for students to study and complete them in a given timeframe. Students will access and learn the content at the time and location of their choice.

Asynchronous pre-work must be completed prior to synchronous sessions

Participation and progress at synchronous sessions is required

Missed online homework should be completed within 5 days; there will be a 20% penalty per day late

# 5. Learning Outcomes



- <u>Oral comprehension</u>: recognize the main ideas of connected discourse on a variety of topics beyond the immediacy of the situation.
- <u>Oral production</u>: express themselves clearly and fluently using comprehensible pronunciation and intonation patterns; express likes and dislikes, describe people and places, narrate and describe in the past, express wishes and desires, talk about unrealized and anticipated actions and states, give directions, make suggestions, requests and hypotheses; report speech, express and defend opinions and ideas; hold a meaningful conversation about Hispanic culture.
- <u>Reading comprehension</u>: comprehend authentic documents such as cultural texts, newspaper articles, and fiction.
- <u>Written expression</u>: produce two-page descriptive, narrative and argumentative pieces of writing; generate coherent form and content; compose complex sentences using proper logical connectors and relative pronouns.
- <u>Grammar</u>: control the verb and pronoun systems; follow the sequence of tenses; master the rules of gender, number, and agreement.
- <u>Vocabulary</u>: effectively use a more precise and varied vocabulary to communicate specific meaning and details; expand your passive vocabulary.
- <u>Culture</u>: express yourself according to social circumstances; develop awareness of similarities and differences between your culture and Hispanic worldviews; develop an understanding and appreciation of the wealth of social, intellectual, artistic, historical and political values and manifestations of Hispanic Culture; appreciate and analyze samples of Hispanic literature.

# 9. Communication:




- Students should check the OWL site every 24 48 hours

We strive to maintain high standards that reflect the effort that both students and faculty put into the teaching and learning experience during this course. All students will be treated equally and evaluated based only on their actual achievement. *Final grades* on this course, irrespective of the number of decimal places used in marking individual assignments and tests, will be calculated to one decimal place and rounded to the nearest integer, e.g., 74.4 becomes 74, and 74.5 becomes 75. Marks WILL NOT be bumped to the next grade or GPA, e.g. a 79 will NOT be bumped up to an 80, an 84 WILL NOT be bumped up to an 85, etc. The mark attained is the mark you achieved, and the mark assigned.
