Course Content and Aims

Do you want to keep feeding your passion for all things Italian, while expanding your knowledge of Italian language and culture? This is your course.

Italian 3300 is aimed at developing advanced–level competence in the four basic language skills of reading, writing, speaking and listening. Discussions on a variety of cultural topics such travel, politics, the arts, and use of a wide range of material (films, songs, short stories, newspapers) will help you refine your skills so as to communicate more fluently in Italian. These activities are also meant to increase your intercultural awareness. The course aims to achieve the following:

- expand and consolidate the ability to comprehend Italian in a variety of social situations
- enhance the capacity to communicate in Italian in different cultural contexts with increasing accuracy and competence
- review some of the most challenging grammar topics studied in previous years
- refine the understanding and appreciation of both the history and the contemporary culture of Italy
- strengthen intercultural awareness and skills

Learning Outcomes

You are responsible for the information that follows. Please read it carefully and refer to this syllabus regularly. It is expected that, upon <u>successful</u> completion of this course, the students will have the ability to accomplish the following:

- speak and write in Italian at an advanced level with increasing accuracy and sophistication
- demonstrate a facility to comprehend a wide range of complex authentic texts
- use a variety of Italian expressions and idioms with a growing degree of familiarity and competence
- gain an understanding of the richness of the linguistic and cultural heritage of contemporary Italy
- understand cultural differences between Canadians and Italians

Prerequisite: Italian 2200 or 2250 (formerly 250) or equivalent

Antirequisite: The former Italian 200 and 300

Please note: You are responsible for ensuring that you have successfully completed all course prerequisites (or have special permission from your Dean to waive the prerequisite) and that you have not taken an antirequisite course. If you are not eligible for the course, you may be removed from it at any time, and it will be deleted from your record. In addition, you will receive no adjustment to your fees. These decisions cannot be appealed.

Active participation and preparation

Students are expected to maintain regular attendance and participate actively in class, complete all textbook and/or online assignments on their own and before coming to class, and show willingness to communicate in the target language. Preparation and participation are assessed on the basis of day-to-day preparation, overall in-class performance, willingness to communicate in Italian, and contribution to group work and in-class activities and discussions.

Oral presentation

In the Winter term there will be one oral presentation on topics related to Italian culture.

Tests and Final Exam

There will be 2 tests that will include grammar, compositions, listening, and comprehension sections. Students will receive guidelines about the tests in advance. Students must be present for all evaluations. They will be allowed to write make-up tests only if exceptional circumstances arise. In such cases students are expected to contact their instructor <u>before</u> class and <u>must</u> provide appropriate medical documentation to their home Faculty in order to write a make-up. As a courtesy to your classmates and to avoid disrupting the lecture or distracting your fellow students always turn off your device before entering class and be sure to keep it in your bag, at all times. Students that ignore the electronic device policy will first be given a warning. A second infraction will result in a request to either kindly turn in their device for the duration of the lecture, or to kindly leave.

Laptops can be used for the sole purpose of taking notes. If you plan to take notes on your laptop, please discuss your needs with the Instructor. Use of laptops for purposes other than taking notes (i.e., to access the Internet, watch videos, play games, etc.) is distracting to the instructor and to other students and strictly prohibited. Please be advised that the instructor may require a student to shut down a computer or any electronic device if used for purposes others than those related to the course.

Classroom conduct and etiquette

In an emergency, if you miss class, having someone take notes during your absence is better than nothing. However, please keep in mind that no set of notes, no matter how exhaustive, can duplicate the classroom experience. The best learning takes place in the space between professor and students. In addition, please note that it is your responsibility to get notes from a classmate, and that the instructor is not obliged to share notes or PowerPoint presentations with students.

Recording of lectures is not permitted. Exception: students with Instructor permission, following a request from the Student Development Service.

Lectures in this course provide students with an opportunity to learn. Be courteous to your classmates, respect their right to benefit from the lectures by refraining from loud conversations or chatting. Please do not: leave during lectures, come to class habitually late, surf the web, check your messages, go on Facebook, or otherwise engage in activities that distract from the classroom learning experience and demonstrate a lack of regard for the instructor and your classmates. At times your instructor may employ "active learning" techniques to help students engage with new material. Email policy

Students are expected to utilize email appropriately. This implies that appropriate language should be used at all times. Students are also expected to stay abreast of communication about the course through lectures, ppts, links, and announcements posted in Owl, and are therefore expected to login to Owl on a regular basis.

Emails from students are very welcome, however please make sure that the answer to your questions is not included in the syllabus or course outline, before emailing your instructor. In particular, students are to refrain from emailing the instructor to ask about assigned readings, or drill page/numbers: all current chapters ("Capitoli") are listed in the course schedule and the textbook website. It is your responsibility to familiarize yourself with the information in your course schedule and with the use of the online website at the beginning of the course.

For all other questions, I will do my best to reply as promptly as I can, however, please keep in mind that I may not always find sufficient time to give your email a same day reply, especially later in the day, or on weekends. Emails will be monitored regularly; students will receive a response within up to 48 hours.

When a reply to a question requires meeting in person or setting up a phone appointment, I will notify you.

Ground Rules

Masking Guidelines Students will be expected to wear triple layer, non-medical, paper masks at all times in the classroom as per University policy and public health directives. Students are not permitted to eat or drink while in class to ensure masks stay in place. Students will be able to eat and drink outside of the classroom during scheduled breaks. Course Absences due to Daily COVID Screening Questionnaire Missed assessments (e.g., presentations, essays, quizzes, tests, midterms, etc.) require formal academic considerations (typically self-reported absences and/or academic counselling). Methods for dealing with missed work and course content are at the discretion of the instructor(s). Students should be aware that some learning outcomes cannot be easily made up and may need to be completed in a subsequent year. Your instructor will provide you with further information as to how this applies within this course. Students who demonstrate a pattern of routinely missing coursework due to self-reported COVID symptoms, and therefore do not demonstrate mastery of the learning outcomes of the course, will not receive credit for the course.

Contingency plan for an in-person class pivoting to 100% online learning In the event of a COVID-19 resurgence during the course that necessitates the course delivery moving away from face-to-face interaction, all remaining course content will be delivered entirely online, either synchronously (i.e., at the times indicated in the timetable) or asynchronously (e.g., posted on OWL for students to view at their convenience). The grading scheme will not change. Any remaining assessments will also be conducted online as determined by the course instructor. In the event that online learning is required, a stable internet connection with working microphone and webcam will be required. As has been the case in the past, the decision to pivot to online learning will be made by Western, and not individual instructors or departments (excepting temporary online instruction in the event of instructor illness).

PLEASE NOTE:

- Western has both a vaccine and a mask mandate
- Students must complete the symptom checklist every day. Students who are found to be on campus who have not completed the symptom checklist or have failed the daily symptom check will be referred for investigation under the Student Code of Conduct.
- Students are expected to carry their student cards to campus each day in anticipation of spot checks by Building Ambassadors.
- Students not wearing masks will be asked to leave the classroom. Students with accommodations approved by Accessible Education must make arrangements with the instructor *before* coming to class, lab, practicum or clinical site.
