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**DESCRIPTION**

This course is a survey of Friedrich Nietzsche's philosophical writings, including texts from his early, middle, and late periods. Among the topics to be considered are his genealogical critique of morality, his theory of aesthetic creation and artistic experience, his doctrine of eternal recurrence, his conception of the *Übermensch*, and the significance of his declaration of the death of God.

**OBJECTIVES**

Students completing this course successfully will (1) be familiar with some of the key works of one of the most enigmatic figures in the history of philosophy, (2) have demonstrated an ability to comprehend complex philosophical arguments and reflect critically upon them, and (3) be able to write concise argumentative papers exhibiting research competence.

**REQUIREMENTS**

Evaluation will consist in a combination of a midterm exam, short assignments, and a final research paper.

**AUDIT**

Students wishing to audit the course should consult with the instructor prior to or during the first week of classes. All auditors will be expected to complete the regular short assignments as a condition of attendance.
