**DESCRIPTION**

How we should act and how we should organize ourselves are two important questions faced by members of any society. This course will examine what both moral and political philosophy have to offer as guidance for answering these questions. The course will introduce different theoretical frameworks for evaluating moral and political claims and then apply them to controversial problems facing contemporary society. Each class will strive for a good balance between lecture and discussion. Philosophy is not a spectator sport, and participation in class discussions is highly encouraged!

In the autumn term, we will be largely concerned with the morality of decisions involving life and death in the health care context. Accordingly, we will be examining and evaluating debates about stem cell research and the moral status of the human embryo, abortion, euthanasia and physician-assisted suicide. We will close the term with a look at the ethical treatment of non-human animals. In the winter, we will broaden our focus to cover issues of sexual morality, of sex, gender and race, punishment, war and terrorism, and our obligations to the global poor.
