PREREQUISITE

Philosophy 2200F/G, or 1.0 from Medieval Studies 1022, or both of Medieval Studies 1025A/B and 1026A/B or the former Medieval Studies 1020E.

DESCRIPTION

This course is a brief survey of some main problems in medieval philosophy. It deals with questions about logic, universals, cognition, ethics, the existence of God, determinism and free will, and scientific knowledge. It looks at these issues through the texts of the medieval philosophers themselves and traces these problems from Ancient times to scholasticism.
