# **DESCRIPTION**

The course will provide students in science, health science and the humanities with an introduction to ethical issues in human experimentation. The course will review relevant history, an ethical framework for research ethics, and cover core topics, including informed consent, confidentiality, benefit-harm analysis, participant selection, vulnerable participants and communities. Special topics, such as randomized controlled trials, first-in-human experiments, gene therapy trials, cluster randomized trials, social science research, and health policy and systems research may also be covered.

Prerequisite(s): PHIL 2715F/G Health Care Ethics is recommended but not required.

## **TEXTS**

There is no required textbook. Two or three articles will be assigned for each week of the course.

## **OBJECTIVES**

The course has three main objectives. First, it will familiarize students with the history of research involving human participants and the development of major ethical codes and regulations. Second, it will expose them to a variety of key ethical issues raised by research involving human participants. Third, it will give students an opportunity to apply key ethical concepts to real cases selected from the scientific literature.

#### **REQUIREMENTS**

Your grade for the course will be based on three written case analyses and participation. There is no midterm or final examination.

Case analysis 1 Due date: October 4, 2017 Length: No more than 1250 words Format: Write an ethical analysis of a contemporary ethics case, drawing on course readings. Value: 30% of final grade

Case analysis 2 Due date: November 8, 2017 Length: No more than 1250 words Format: Write an ethical analysis of a contemporary ethics case, drawing on course readings.

### Value: 30% of final grade

Case analysis 3 Due date: December 6, 2017 Length: No more than 1250 words Format: Write an ethical analysis of a contemporary ethics case, drawing on course readings. Value: 30% of final grade

Participation Student participation (attendance, preparation, participation in discussion) will be assessed throughout the course. Value: 10%
