DESCRIPTION

Analytic philosophy, as pursued over the last century, seems incredibly remote from the concerns that defined modern philosophy from Descartes to Kant. How did we get here from there? The analytic turn started from a sense that traditional methods had failed to answer the traditional questions of philosophy-- or even posed the questions clearly. To go beyond the limitations of Kant and his predecessors, according to the analytic philosophers, they needed a better understanding of the nature and function of language in our thought. Some of the most challenging problems in philosophy, they argued, stemmed from misunderstandings about the ways in which reality and our knowledge of it are represented in language. Their work on these problems had an impact far beyond the traditional boundaries of philosophy: they played a part in revolutionary developments in mathematics, physics, and the foundations of computer science.

We will study the major themes and motivations of analytic philosophy, starting from their connections and conflicts with earlier traditions, especially the metaphysics and epistemology of earlier modern philosophy. Authors to be studied will include Kant, Frege, Russell, Wittgenstein, Stebbing, Carnap, Quine, Grice, Strawson, Austin, and Putnam.

TEXTS

All assigned readings (articles or excerpts from books) will be posted under "Resources" on the 3040G OWL site.

OBJECTIVES

1. To grasp some of the most important and influential philosophical ideas
2. To understand how philosophical questions are framed
3. To relate philosophical ideas to larger issues in society, culture, and history
4. To understand the connections between philosophy and other fields of human thought
5. To develop competence in critical analysis by careful reading and discussion
6. To develop skills of oral expression and argument through class discussion
7. To develop writing skills through written assignments

REQUIREMENTS

2 short writing assignments (each 25% of final mark); one final exam (40%); active participation in class (10%).

EVALUATION OF ACADEMIC PERFORMANCE

At least three days prior to the deadline for withdrawal from a course without academic penalty, students will receive assessment of work accounting for at least 15% of their final grade. For 3000- or 4000-level courses in which such a graded assessment is impracticable, the instructor(s) must obtain an exemption from this policy from the Dean and this exemption must be noted on the corresponding course syllabus. In rare instances and at the Dean's discretion, other courses could receive a similar exemption, which also must be noted in the course syllabus.
