COURSE DESCRIPTION

Schopenhauer's philosophy is notable for its distinctive metaphysics of the will, its theory of redemption through art, its compassion-based ethics, and its innovative comparative methodology. In this course we will survey the entire compass of Schopenhauer's thought, including his metaphysics, epistemology, ethics, and aesthetic theory. Our focus will be on his main and most famous text, the first volume of *The World as Will and Representation*, though we will also explore his later ethical writings and occasionally draw on the second volume of his opus.

LEARNING OUTCOMES

Students completing this course successfully will (1) be familiar with some of the key works of one of the most enigmatic figures in the history of philosophy, (2) have demonstrated an ability to comprehend complex philosophical arguments and reflect critically upon them, and (3) be able to write concise argumentative papers exhibiting research competence.

Your final assignments should in any case reflect your own critical thinking and independent work.
