## **Prerequisites:**

A minimum mark of 60% in one of Calculus 1501A/B, Numerical and Mathematical Methods 1414A/B, the former Applied Mathematics 1414A/B, the former Applied Mathematics 1413, or a minimum mark of 85% in Calculus 1301A/B. Integrated Science 1001X with a minimum mark of 60% can be used in place of Calculus 1301A/B.

Anti-requisites: Actuarial Science 2053

Priority to students enrolled in a module offered by the Department of Mathematics, and the Department of Statistical and Actuarial Sciences.

Unless you meet the requisites and the anti-requisites requirements for this course or have written special permission to enroll in it, you may be removed from this course and it will be deleted from your record. # 3. Course Syllabus, Schedule, Delivery Mode

## **Course Description:**

Time value of money, accumulation and discount functions, effective rates of interest and discount and present values, as applied to annuities and other financial products, and/or applications including loan repayment schedules and methods.

## Topics

A tentative weekly schedule will be posted on OWL.

 Chapter 1 – The Time Value of Money (2 weeks) Accumulation and amount functions; effective rate of interest; accumulating and discounting with simple and compound interest; time periods; rate of discount; nominal rates of interest and

with simple and compound interest; time periods; rate of discount; nominal rates of interest and discount; force of interest and discount; varying interest

- Chapter 2 Equivalence Equations (1 week) Equations of value; determining the length of time or rate of interest for an investment; treasury bills; real rate of interest
- Chapter 3 Simple Annuities (2 weeks) Annuity immediate; annuity-due; deferred and forborne annuities; determining the length of an annuity; determining the rate of return
- Chapter 4 Other Types of Annuities (2 weeks) Annuities payable more or less frequently than interest is compounded; perpetuities; continuous annuities; varying annuities
- Chapter 5 Repayment of Debts (2 weeks) Amortization schedules; determining the outstanding balance of a debt; sinking fund method of repaying a loan; refinancing a loan
- Chapter 6 Bonds (1.5 weeks) Bond prices on and between coupon dates; amortization of a bond, callable bonds, determining the rate of return
- Chapter 7 Rates of Return (1.5 weeks) Internal rate of return; net present value; dollar-weighted and time-weighted rates of interest; dividend discount model

- Chapter 8 Yield Curves (1 week) Term structure of interest rates; spot rates; forward rates; the yield curve
- Chapter 9 Asset-Liability Management (if time permits) Duration; modified duration; convexity; immunization

#### Calculator

A <u>non-programmable</u> calculator is required for lectures, assignments, midterms, and the final exam.

- BA II Plus Professional
- TI 30Xa or TI 30XA, same model just different casing, both approved.
- TI-30X II (IIS solar or IIB battery)
- TI-30XS MultiView (or XB battery)

# 5. Methods of Evaluation

#### University Accreditation Program - Canadian Institute of Actuaries (CIA)

Honours Specialization in Actuarial Science

If you graduate from Western with an HSP in Actuarial Science, this course will be one of the courses that you will take in your program that will allow you to be exempt from the preliminary exams of the Society of Actuaries (SOA). If your plan is to become a fully qualified actuary working in Canada, then all you would need to do is graduate from your HSP in actuarial science and you would then be eligible for the CIA <u>Capstone Exam</u>. Taking and passing this exam, along with completing two online modules and a practice education course, would make you eligible to become an ACIA (Associate of the Canadian Institute of Actuaries).

Major in Actuarial Science

If you graduate from Western with a major in Actuarial Science, the CIA accreditation program will not apply to you. If your plan is to become a fully qualified actuary, then you will need to continue to write and pass the preliminary exams of the SOA.

All Academic Consideration requests must include supporting documentation; however, recognizing that formal documentation may not be available in some extenuating circumstances, the policy allows students to make <u>one</u> Academic Consideration request **without supporting documentation** in this course. However, the following assessments are excluded from this, and therefore always require formal supporting documentation:

• The final exam

When a student <u>mistakenly</u> submits their <u>one</u> allowed Academic Consideration request **without supporting documentation** for the assessments listed above or those in the **Coursework with Assessment Flexibility** section below, <u>the request cannot be recalled and reapplied</u>. This privilege is forfeited.

#### **Evaluation Scheme for Missed Assessments**

#### Policy for using a self-reported absence (SRA)

- You may use your SRA for any **ONE** of the two midterms and the three assignments.
- You may do so only ONCE. Any missed subsequent assessment would require a formal approval, or you will receive 0% for that assessment.
- An absence from the final exam ALWAYS requires a formal approval.
- You may not use your SRA retrospectively for attempted or completed works. For example, you may not use your SRA halfway through a midterm or after the grades have been released.

#### **Missed assignments**

If you miss an assignment with proper approval, the weight of the missed assignment will be redistributed among the remaining assignments. If you miss all three assignments with proper approvals, their combined weight will be allocated to the final exam.

#### **Missed midterms**

No make-up midterms will be offered. If you miss a midterm with proper documentation, the weight of the missed midterm will be reassigned to the final exam. Please note that only the Dean's Office or Academic Counseling unit can approve such accommodations.

For instance, if you miss one midterm with proper approval, the final exam's weight will increase to 71%. If you miss two midterms with proper approval, the final exam's weight will rise to 91%. However, if you miss any midterm without appropriate approval, you will receive a zero for that midterm.

#### **Absences from Final Examinations**

If you miss the Final Exam, please contact the Academic Counselling office of your Faculty of Registration as soon as you are able to do so. They will assess your eligibility to write the Special Examination (the name given by the University to a makeup Final Exam).

You may also be eligible to write the Special Exam if you are in a "Multiple Exam Situation" (e.g., more than 2 exams in 23-hour period, more than 3 exams in a 47-hour period).

If a student fails to write a scheduled Special Examination, the date of the next Special Examination (if granted) normally will be the scheduled date for the final exam the next time this course is offered. The maximum course load for that term will be reduced by the credit of the course(s) for which the final examination has been deferred. See the Academic Calendar for details (under Special Examinations).
