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<u>Course Description</u>: This course is an historical, theoretical, and analytical introduction to Shakespeare's plays in performance. We will focus on specific problems related to past productions and to those in the current Stratford Festival season.

<u>Readings for the class</u>: Please complete these readings BEFORE the course starts on July 17th. Note that any **scholarly** edition (e.g. Arden, Folger, Oxford University Press) of the plays will be acceptable for the course. If you're not sure about the edition, please ask!

Essay Topics:

<u>Essay 1</u>: Due Tuesday, July 25, worth 20%: Write a 750-word performance analysis of *Timon of Athens*, focusing on one literary element and one performance element of the show that we will have seen on Friday, July 21st. Ask one significant question about the relationship between that one literary aspect and the one performance aspect you have chosen, and offer a clear response to your question. **Use standard MLA format.**

Examples of literary elements: patterns of imagery, significant repetition, rhetorical devices such as paradox, language play such as puns, metaphors, similes, versification, soliloquies, irony

Examples of performance elements: lighting, sets, costumes, sound, music, props, blocking, levels of playing, fight choreography, dance choreography, make up, color, special effects

<u>Test</u>: In-class Wednesday, August 2nd, 2 hours, worth 40%. Format TBA.

<u>Essay 2</u>: Due Friday, August 4th, worth 40%: Write a 1500-word essay in which you present an argument that considers BOTH one of the articles we have read AND a performance of one of the plays we have seen. **Use MLA format and cite carefully!** Ask for help if you have any questions.
