I've served terms as Chair of Political Science at both Western and the State University of New York. At SUNY, I led twenty departments as Chair of the Faculty of Arts, Humanities, and Social Sciences and I also founded two interdisciplinary centres there. I am currently the Director of the Centre for Computational and Quantitative Social Science.

Canadian universities have an urgent and expanded role to play in higher education -- something I've written about in public scholarship. Attacks on science and universities in the United States leave us with greater responsibilities and opportunities. International students are looking for the ever-rarer combination of a world-class university in a politically stable and welcoming country. Many of the world's best researchers are rethinking where to build their futures. Western should be leading these efforts. Once-in-a-century opportunities are at our doorstep. We need to get our budgets in order while seizing them. As part of that, improving our commitment to graduate programs is essential to our research future. I've worked in several administrative roles and I know the obstacles that often prevent the implementation of bold strategic plans. Improvement requires creativity, ambition, and deep conversations of where policies and values conflict.

I am proud to have spent my career as a clinician-scientist at Western University where I have benefited from the richness of its environment and culture. Through this, I gained governance experience as a Divisional Chair and Department Head, followed by two terms as Dean of the Schulich School of Medicine and Dentistry. During the latter, I also chaired the Association of Faculties of Medicine of Canada, rebuilding its governance structure and beginning the process of addressing the calls to action of the Truth and Reconciliation Commission of Canada. I carried the experience from these activities into my term as President of the Canadian Institutes of Health Research (CIHR), overseeing all of Canada's federally funded health research including its expansion during the pandemic, a 1.3B budget and the development of a 10-year strategic plan that included clearly defined principles of equity, diversity and inclusiveness. I also oversaw a complete restructuring of CIHR's governance and budgetary processes to reflect best fiscal practices and activity-based planning principles. With all of this, I have gained a deep understanding of the culture of success for Canada's leading academic institutions and am keen to share these as Western embarks on its next chapter.
