Course Objectives

This course prepares students for careers traversing a variety of healthcare delivery models by engaging writing and rhetorical strategies for clinical, forensic, and corporate environments. Topics include everything from narrative medicine and medical blogging to executive hospital communication and the influence of the popular media on patient expectations. In this latest offering, particular attention is paid to communication strategies, public messaging, and storytelling practices surrounding the 2020 pandemic.

Assignment Format

Written assignments are to be typed and have your name, course name, and instructor's name on the first page. When citing sources in a paper, you will be expected to follow APA standards for documentation.

Submitting Assignments

Assignments are due via OWL by 4:30 p.m. on the specified due date reflected on the course site. Assignments must be submitted in either .doc, .docx, or .pdf format only—.pdf is always preferred. Late assignments will be penalized at the rate of 5% per day unless I have granted you an extension in writing. Assignments submitted after 4:30 p.m. are graded as though they are received the day after they are uploaded.

If hard copies of assignments are deemed necessary, please submit assignments in class or via the Writing Department Drop Box outside Lawson Hall 3270, making sure you include your instructor's name and your section number. However, do not:

- fax assignments
- e-mail assignments

Also, be aware that you are responsible for keeping copies of all assignments submitted.



Attendance policies

Attendance at class is required to improve as a writer. A ledger is circulated in each class requiring that students confirm their attendance in writing for tracking attendance and punctuality. Regular attendance is expected and simply signing the register in each class will not ensure a strong class work grade on its own. Regular and impassioned participation in class discussions and workshops is the best method for excelling in this area of the grading rubric. Here is the Writing Studies attendance policy in this class:

- You may miss up to three hours (the equivalent of one week of class) of class meetings during the term without explanation. That means that the first three class hours you miss will be recorded as absences but excused provided you don't miss any more.
- However, if you miss a total of four to nine class hours (the equivalent of up to three full weeks
 of class), your final grade will be reduced by 10% (e.g. an earned final grade of 80% will be
 reported as a final grade of 72).
- If you miss a total of more than nine hours of class meetings (the equivalent of more than three weeks of class meetings) your final grade will be reduced by 15% (e.g. an earned final grade of 80% will be reported as a final grade of 68).

This policy will be waived only for medical or compassionate reasons. If you have good reasons for waiving an absence of one class meeting (e.g. if you've missed three hours, and need or want to miss another class meeting) discuss these reasons with your instructor within one week of that absence. If your absence is extended and prolonged (over one week of continuous non-attendance), then you should discuss it with your academic advisor in your home faculty, who may require documentation. That advisor may then contact all of your instructors. See also: 'Medical Accommodation Policy' to follow.



N.B.: The third hour of each lecture is reserved for an in class screening/tutorial featuring the critically acclaimed HBO/Cinemax series *The Knick*. The third assignment in this course (Response Essay) will require a critical evaluation of one of four questions related to this series as a didactic narrative, including its place in the social and literary history of Western medicine. Please note that the series contains some disturbing images, offensive language, and other adult content, much like one will find in the real world of healthcare delivery environments.

<u>Note</u>: Absences from classes reserved for peer review workshops will not only affect your final attendance/participation grade but will have the incur the additional penalty of an immediate 10% deduction from any grade received on the final version of that same assignment. The peer review process is foundational to improving as a writer and is a core function of this course and the associated learning objectives and pedagogy. Failure to attend class on these dates not only undermines the ability for your assignment to receive feedback and proofreading services from your colleagues but also disrupts this process for the entire class.

Attendance also extends to tardiness. If you are more than 20 minutes late, you will be penalized an hour of attendance. Please make every effort to be on time as late entry can disrupt the flow of discussion in our class. Early departures from class, which have not been previously arranged with the instructor, will also be counted as an absence. If you leave during the break, you will be docked an hour of attendance.

Scholastic Offences, including Plagiarism

Students must write their essays and assignments in their own words. Whenever students take an idea, or a passage of text from another author, they must acknowledge their debt both by using quotation marks where appropriate and by proper referencing such as footnotes or citations. Plagiarism is a major academic offence (see Scholastic Offence Policy as above).

"All required papers may be subject to submission for textual similarity review to the commercial plagiarism detection software under license to the University for the detection of plagiarism. All papers submitted for such checking will be included as source documents in the reference database for the purpose of detecting plagiarism of papers subsequently submitted to the system. Use of the service is subject to the licensing agreement currently between The University of Western Ontario and Turnitin.com (http://www.turnitin.com)."

Note: In this course you will be required to submit an electronic copy of the final version of each of your essays to turnitin.com through your section's OWL home page.

Prerequisites

The University Senate requires the following statement to appear on course outlines:

Accommodation Policy

<u>Note</u>: the official Western <u>Accommodation Policy</u> appears below. This is in effect, but may be modified temporarily by the university during the academic year as conditions change.

Students with disabilities work with Accessible Education (formerly SSD) which provides recommendations for accommodation based on medical documentation or psychological and cognitive

testing. The accommodation policy can be found here: <u>Academic Accommodation for Students with</u> Disabilities.

Academic Consideration for Student Absence

Students will have up to two (2) opportunities during the regular academic year to use an on-line portal to self-report an absence during the term, provided the following conditions are met: the absence is no more than 48 hours in duration, and the assessment for which consideration is being sought is worth 30% or less of the student's final grade. Students are expected to contact their instructors by email within 24 hours of the end of the period of the self-reported absence. Students are not able to use the self-reporting option in the following circumstances:

- for exams scheduled by the Office of the Registrar (e.g., December and April exams)
- absence of a duration greater than 48 hours,
- assessments worth more than 30% of the student's final grade,
- if a student has already used the self-reporting portal twice during the academic year

If the conditions for a Self-Reported Absence are *not* met, students will need to provide a Student Medical Certificate if the absence is medical, or provide appropriate documentation if there are compassionate grounds for the absence in question. Students are encouraged to contact their Faculty academic counselling office to obtain more information about the relevant documentation.

Students should also note that individual instructors are not permitted to receive documentation directly from a student, whether in support of an application for consideration on medical grounds, or for other reasons. All documentation required for absences that are not covered by the Self-Reported Absence Policy must be submitted to the Academic Counselling office of a student's Home Faculty.
