

**Writing 2520A:
Write Now!: Writers on Writing
Fall 2026**

COURSE DESCRIPTION AND OBJECTIVES:

Though a series of lectures by contemporary writers, *Write Now!*, explores the art, craft, and process of creative writing in a variety of genres. Course topics include inspiration, overcoming creative blocks, revision, social media, publishing, literary citizenship, and the writing life.

Learning Outcomes:

Upon successful completion of this course, students will have demonstrated the ability to

- 1) identify the fundamental elements of the craft of creative writing
- 2) generate ideas in a variety of genres
- 3) understand concepts relating to contemporary creative writing practices
- 4) execute a dedicated writing practice through weekly writing exercises

REQUIRED TEXTS AND COURSE MATERIALS:

There is no textbook for this course. The core material of the course is presented in the lectures, and, most importantly, in the presentations given by the visiting speakers. So, students need to be prepared to attend lectures regularly, listen carefully, and take detailed notes.

Note: You are not required to buy the books of the authors who present in the course. However, there will be copies of their books for sale, and you are encouraged to buy books from the authors you like and connect with. Remember, the best way to support writers and engage with the literary community is to buy and read books.

No aids are permitted for the final exam. Electronic devices of any kind (including calculators, cell phones, and smart watches) are not permitted.

ASSIGNMENT FORMAT:

The quizzes and the midterm will be written in class. The quizzes will be written on Mondays, and the midterm on a Wednesday (see the class schedule below for the specific dates).

The quizzes will consist of one question about the material from a recent lecture or visiting speaker talk. The midterm will be 2 hours long, and it will focus on the content of the lectures and speaker talks. It may also contain questions that ask students to reflect on their engagement with the course and their own writing practice.

The exam will be 3 hours long and it will be written during the exam period. Like the midterm, the questions will focus on the content of the lectures and speaker talks, and ask students to reflect on their engagement with the course and their own writing practice.

Note: the focus of the assignments on content presented in class is why attendance is particularly important.

PREREQUISITES:

The only prerequisite for this course is the successful completion of first year.

ATTENDANCE POLICIES:

As noted above, the primary content of this course is presented in class in the form of lectures delivered by the professor and talks given by visiting speakers. For this reason, attendance is essential. Importantly, attendance extends not only to being present in class, but also to paying consistent attention to and taking notes on what is being said.

The primary mechanisms by which attendance is evaluated in this course are the quizzes, the midterm, and the exam. If you want to do well on them, you need to come to class, pay attention in class, and take notes on what you are hearing.

Note: a class meeting missed in order to write a test, exam, or other form of 'make-up class' in another course **will** count as non-attendance, and **will** attract penalties as defined above if applicable. Instructors at the University of Western Ontario **shall not require** a student to write a make-up test or similar at times which conflict with that student's other scheduled class times. If you are asked or 'required' to do this, you should immediately contact an academic counsellor in your Dean's office. If you elect to miss a class in order to write such a test, that is **your** choice; your absence will not be excused.

Scholastic Offences, including Plagiarism:

Whenever students take an idea, or a passage of text from another author, they must acknowledge their debt both by using quotation marks where appropriate and by proper referencing such as footnotes or citations. Plagiarism is a major academic offence.

All required papers may be subject to submission for textual similarity review to the commercial plagiarism detection software under license to the University for the detection of plagiarism. All papers submitted for such checking will be included as source documents in the reference database for the purpose of detecting plagiarism of papers subsequently submitted to the system. In this course, students are permitted to use AI tools for information gathering and preliminary research purposes **only** (unless otherwise indicated in the assignment instructions). These tools are intended to enhance the learning experience by providing access to diverse information sources. It is essential, however, that students critically evaluate the obtained information, exercise independent thinking, and engage in original research to synthesize, develop, and articulate their own ideas, arguments, and perspectives. The use of AI tools can serve as a starting point for exploration, but students are expected to uphold academic integrity by appropriately attributing all sources and avoiding plagiarism in any form. Note that for all assignments completed outside of class, the instructor can require you to attend an in-person interview to discuss your work and/or to review research notes, rough drafts, outlines and other materials used in preparing the assignment before a mark is finalized. Assignments should always reflect students' own thoughts and constitute independent written work. By adhering to these guidelines, students contribute to a responsible and ethical learning environment that promotes critical thinking, supports independent inquiry, and encourages original written contributions.

Academic Consideration Policy:
